Preparing for Your Visit

FPC staff are working to assess and organize the contents of the Brick House. Here is a fascinating item that evokes a new world of international travel in the late 1930s. This Special Pass was issued to the Honorable Frances Perkins for the first passenger flight of Pan Am's Yankee Clipper service.

The plane was christened by Eleanor Roosevelt on March 3, 1939, using waters from the seven seas, rather than champagne. One of the largest aircraft of its time, twelve Boeing 314 Clipper flying boats were built between 1938 and 1941 for long range service, nine of which served Pan Am. This beautiful brass pass is still preserved in its somewhat tattered but original cloth bag and presentation box. We would love to find out if Miss Perkins actually flew on the Clipper to the UK!
